be requested by you in your letters of May 22 and June 17, 1943, I can now outline the Commission's film requirements for 1943. They are essentially as discussed in our July 21 meeting. Briefly stated, the Commission desires two types of films: (1) a **Joint Forces Commander's** final report to the Commission and the Joint Chiefs of Staff of the atomic operation; and (2) short films (so called "snippets") which will be available as soon as possible after each test. While the Atomic Energy Commission recognises the public information value of an unclassified commentary film, we do not consider just expenditure of funds for this purpose would be justified at this time. The Commission is also considering the production of a film depicting the entire history of the development of thermonuclear weapons, and it is anticipated that some footage will be required at this time in this respect. Inasmuch as plans are not as yet firm concerning this production, you will be advised at later date of Commission requirements at that time.

The visual report or "commentary" film of the test operation should bear a classification not higher than CONFIDENTIAL, should be approximately of forty-five minutes duration, and should be devoid of technical details concerning thermonuclear developments. It should be tailored for wide dissemination to groups concerned with supporting the atomic energy Commission but who do not require technical information, i.e. such groups as Congressmen and members of the Budget officials. The "footnotes" should be filmed so as to provide quick visual information soon after each shot to the Commissioners and other Commission personnel. The chief value in such

films is their ability to satisfy the inevitable demand for information beyond that normally furnished by a general statement of yield and degree of success in executing a given shot. Speed in production and forwarding "quickies" following each shot is the keynote here.
